ENGLAND HOLDS U.S. SIX

Gains Scoreless Tie in Tight Defensive Struggle

Garmisch-Partenkirchen, February 16.—(AP)—Playing desperately for a draw which gave them the Olympic hockey championship in view of Canada's 1-0 victory over the Americans today, Great Britain's ice forces fought through three regular and three overtime periods to a scoreless tie with the United States squad on Saturday night.

Coached by the canny Canadian, Percy Nicklin, of Moncton, N.B., the English presented an airtight defense throughout and the occasional American sallies that broke through found an impregnable barrier in Jammy Foster, the great goalkeeper from Winnipeg and Moncton Hawks.

The Americans fought with their backs to the wall as they went into the overtime before a packed stadium, but the British defenses were too strong.
