BASLE, Switzerland, Feb. 12 (AP).

—A burst of scoring in the first period that netted three goals in the eighth minute swept Canada to a 4-to-0 victory over the United States in the final game of the world amateur hockey championship today.

Penoit of the Trail Smoke Eaters, the Dominion team, broke through for the first two goals and Dame made the third a few seconds later. Maurice completed the rout by netting the puck in the twelfth minute

of the second period.

The game capped a steady drive to the title, won last year by the Sudbury Wolves of Canada. The Smoke Eaters won two games in the closing round, shutting out Czecho-Slovakia, 4 to 0, and Switzerland, 7—0. The United States also won its first two games in the final round, shading the Swiss, 2 to 1, and Czecho-Slovakia, 1 to 0, in overtime.

It was the third straight title for Canada. The Kimberley Dynamiters

BASLE, Switzerland, Feb. 9.—The United States, Canada, Switzerland and Czecho-Slovakia advanced today into the finals of the world amateur hockey championship. Each will play the others three times to determine the championship.

The Americans won their fifth game in six starts today in a 4-to-2 performance against Poland, while the Canadians overwhelmed Germany, 9 to 0, to maintain their undefeated record. They have had only one goal scored against them.

Czecho-Slovakia defeated Great Britain, 2 to 0, to tie Germany in games won and lost, but reached the final "pool" because of a greater number of goals scored.

Switzerland won its place in the finals by defeating the United States yesterday.

In the Americans' contest today George (Pud) Quirk of Providence, R. I., continued to star, along with Art Bogue of Detroit.

Quirk combined with Ed Nicholson of Cleveland for the first goal early in the second period and skated through the entire Polish team later for an unassisted marker.

Bogue scored twice in the third period, once unassisted from a difficult angle and again on a pass from Dick Maley of Ridley Park, Pa.

# U.S. HOCKEY TEAM BOWS TO SWISS, 3-2

Americans Kick 2 Goals Into Own Net—Deciding Marker Awarded by Referee

BASLE, Switzerland, Feb. 8 (P).

The United States hockey team today received its first setback in the world amateur championship tournament, losing to Switzerland, 3—2.

Two of Switzerland's goals were kicked into the net by American players, while the third was awarded to the victors by the referee because the cage had been moved.

The winning goal in this weird match, played before 14,000 spectators, came in the seventh minute of the final period. The Swiss forward, Kessler, drove a long shot toward the American goal. At the same moment the cage was bumped aside and, although the puck missed it, the Polish referee, Sachs, allowed the goal to count.

The Americans, on the offensive from the start, tallied twice in the first period. After George Quirk of Providence, R. I., had missed a good chance, Alan Dan of St. Paul drove home the first counter in the seventh minute of play. Six minutes later, Art Bogue of Detroit made it 2—0.

The first Swiss score came in the opening minute of the second period when Delnon shot from the middle of the rink. Dan blocked the puck but kicked it into his own goal. Three minutes later Edward Mako of Marquette, Mich., American goalie, blocked another long shot but he also inadvertently kicked the puck into the cage.

QUIRK IS AMERICAN ACE

He Breaks Through for Pair of Goals—Dominion Team Routs Czecho-Slovakia

ZURICH, Switzerland, Feb. 11 (P).—The United States beat Switzerland, 2 to 1, and Canada shut out Czecho-Slovakia, 4 to 0, today in the second games of the final "pool" in the world amateur hockey championships. The title will go to the winner of the meeting between the United States and Canada tomorrow.

A crowd of 14,000 fans watched the United States team revenge the defeat it suffered to the Swiss in

the semi-final pool.

The battle started evenly, and it was not until the sixteenth minute of the first period that the greater speed of the Americans brought a goal. George (Pud) Quirk of Providence, R. I., a consistent star throughout the tournament, skated through most of the Swiss team to ram home the score.

In a dramatic final period, with the Swiss spectators shouting wildly, Switzerland tied the score. The veteran forward Torriani was replaced by a youngster named Reudi, who counted in the twelfth minute.

The United States retaliated by sending five men down the ice in repeated attacks until Quirk broke through for another goal one min-

ute before the final whistle.
