Members of Canada's Penitence Vs admit they have been under heavy pressure. But with the nine-country tournament at the halfway mark and four straight victories under their belts, the players feel they are well into it.

The Vs took it easy today, the first of the two off days they have in the tournament which now appears to be biding time until the big game Sunday between Canada and Russia.

Monday night, in what was little more than target practice for the sharpshooting Canadian forwards, the Vs trounced Finland 12-0. Playing coach Grant Warwick used his reserves freely, and the Russians did the same to win over Poland 8-2. The United States had to hustle in the third period for its 7-3 victory against Switzerland.

### Share The Lead

Canada and Russia, the only other undefeated team, share the lead with 4-0 records. But the Canadians have scored 37 goals to 24 for the Russians. This apparent edge around the nets may make the difference.

The goal average would decide the world title if more than two teams finish in a first-place tie, a remote possibility. A tie between

two teams would be settled in a playoff.

Just how are the Canadians shaping up mentally and physically for what promises to be the big one with the Soviets?

Some players say they had the jitters against the Czechs. But with that hurdle past them, the

Canadians are relaxing more and sleeping well.

But all of them have lost weight, mainly because they haven't put enough liquids into their systems, says the club's physician, Dr. Bill White, who paid his own way over to look after the team.

### Not Pasteurized

All the players are milk drinkers, but they haven't touched the German product because it isn't pasteurized. However, the team is drinking lots of water.

Little Dick Warwick, the 27-year-old centre of Penitence's Dick-Grant-Bill brother combination said he was never so tense as before the Czech game, not even in the Allan Cup finals when the Vs came from behind to win the championship from Sudbury.

"I had no strength in my arms or legs. A lot of the others felt it too including Grant."

"You do silly things, you think you're moving when you're not. You give the puck away and you lower your head and pass blind."

"But we're pretty well into it now."

A Swedish newspaper man made the comment that only nerves can beat Canada. He has \$60 bet on the Canadians with Czech sports writers.

### Went All Out

Unlike some Canadian observers who saw the Czechs lose to the

Russians 4-0 Sunday night, he figures the Czechs were going all out against the U.S.S.R.

"The Czechs were tired from the game against Canada but now apparently they have a complex. They just can't seem to beat the Russians. We Swedes, who played Russia six times this season, know the Czechs never win against them."

The Swede, an expert on continental hockey, says Vsevolod Bobrov, the Russian captain and acknowledged star, is the man to watch.

"We always have a man on him, every move seems to come from

him. The Russians are not such good stickhandlers, but they're very fast, good skaters and pass well. But they don't shoot as well as Canada."

### Become Disorganized

He added that the Russians become disorganized under pressure.

A lot of the pressure was off Monday night for the Canadians in their romp over the Finns at Duesseldorf. They scored seven goals in the first period, three in the second and two in the third.

Finnish goalie Voutilainen made 53 saves and was warmly congratulated by the whole Canadian team.

The Vs took it easy today, the first of the two off days they have in the tournament which now appears to be biding time until the big game Sunday between Canada and Russia.

Last night, in what was little more than target practice for the sharpshooting Canadian forwards, the Vs trounced Finland, 12-0. Playing-coach Grant Warwick used his reserves freely, and the Russians did the same to win over Poland, 8-2. The United States had to hustle in the third period for its 7-3 victory against Switzerland.

The two players who have been ailing, Ed Kassian and Dino Mascotto, will be replaced in a day or so by Winger Jim Middleton and Defenceman Jack Taggart, who are flying from Canada.

As for the pressure in the tournament, "non-competitors do not know what pressure is," said little Dickie Warwick, drinking watered-down German coffee in his hotel.

"We've known for months that we were coming. Hundreds of people have been telling us how and why we should win. There is no second place here.

"Everybody is relaxing more now. We are sleeping well and we need to be relaxed for our style of hockey, which keeps the pressure on."

### TENSE BEFORE GAMES

The 27-year-old centre of Penticton's Dick-Grant-Bill brother combination said he was never so tense as before the Czech game, not even in the Allan Cup finals when the Vs came from behind to win the championship from Sudbury.

Finnish Goalie Viitola Unto made 53 saves and was warmly congratulated by the whole Canadian team.

Mike Shabaga led the attack with three goals and Fairburn got a pair. Nine different players shared in the scoring spree. McAvoy, Don Berry, Bernie Bathgate, Bill Warwick, Hal Tarala, Doug Kilburn and Dick Warwick each scored once.

Only three minor penalties were called in the game, all against the Canadians in the first period. The Vs now have spent a total of 44 minutes in the cooler during the tournament.

"They're a nice little club," said Coach Warwick of the Finns after the game. "They pass well and it was good practice for us."
