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TAMPA BAY LIGHTNING vs. NEW YORK ISLANDERS

SERIES QUICK HITS

* The Lightning and Islanders are facing off in the Stanley Cup Playoffs for the second time. In the 2004 Eastern Conference Quarterfinals, their lone other matchup, Tampa Bay secured a 4-1 series victory en route to its first (and only) Stanley Cup in franchise history.

* The Lightning and Islanders have posted identical 20-15-5 head-to-head records since their meeting in the 2004 Stanley Cup Playoffs. New York, however, won two of their three matchups in 2015-16 and has claimed eight of their last 12 contests dating to Jan. 21, 2013 (NYI: 8-2-2, TBL: 2-7-1).

* This series features the top two selections from the 2009 NHL Draft. The Islanders picked forward **John Tavares** with the first overall selection, while the Lightning drafted defenseman **Victor Hedman** at No. 2. Tavares leads all members of that draft class in goals (207), assists (264) and points (471). Hedman ranks second among defensemen from the 2009 NHL Draft in goals (49) and paces all blueliners from that year in assists (180) and points (229).

DID YOU KNOW?

* The Lightning, who reached their second Stanley Cup Final in franchise history in 2015 (4-2 L vs. CHI), are looking to become the first runner-up to capture the championship the following season since the 2008-09 Penguins.

* The line of **Nikita Kucherov** (5-3—8), **Tyler Johnson** (2-5—7) and **Alex Killorn** (3-2—5) combined for 20 points in the Lightning's five-game victory over the Red Wings in the First Round. That included 10 of the team's 12 goals (as well as three of their four game-winning goals).

* The Lightning set a franchise record with a nine-game winning streak Feb. 18 – March 5, tied for the fourth-longest such run in the NHL this season. They also won nine straight outings at Amalie Arena Jan. 2 – Feb. 12, one shy of matching the club record set Dec. 11, 2014 – Jan. 31, 2015 (10-0-0).

* After establishing a career high and franchise record with 40 victories in 2014-15, goaltender **Ben Bishop** shared fourth place in the NHL with 35 wins this season. He also surpassed **Nikolai Khabibulin** (83) as the winning goaltender in Lightning history, finishing the campaign with 115 in a Tampa Bay uniform.

* Bishop paced the NHL with a 2.06 goals-against average and ranked second with a .926 save percentage, both career highs and single-season franchise records. His six shutouts also were a career high and tied for second place in the League.

DID YOU KNOW?

* Captain **John Tavares** scored both goals for their Islanders in Game 6 of the First Round vs. FLA to power the team to its first series victory since the 1993 Patrick Division Final vs. PIT. Tavares, who tied the game with 53.2 seconds left in regulation and potted the winner at 10:41 of double-overtime, became the second player in Stanley Cup Playoffs to score a last-minute tying goal and overtime goal in a series-clinching victory. The other: Boston's **Patrice Bergeron** in the 2013 CQF vs. TOR.

* The Islanders became the fifth team in NHL history to win consecutive games in one playoff year, both in multiple overtimes with victories in Games 5 and 6 of the First Round vs. FLA (both in 2OT). The others: the 1931 Blackhawks (Games 2 and 3 of F vs. MTL), 1951 Canadiens (Games 1 and 2 of SF vs. DET), 1991 Oilers (Games 2 and 3 of DF vs. LAK) and 2013 Blackhawks (Game 5 of CF vs. LAK and Game 1 of F vs. BOS).

* The Islanders reached the 100-point milestone for the ninth time in franchise history and second consecutive season. They last posted back-to-back 100-point campaigns in 1980-81 and 1981-82, when they captured their second and third of four straight Stanley Cups. Prior to last season, the Islanders had not recorded a 100-point campaign since 1983-84.

* Four different goaltenders picked up at least one win for the Islanders in 2015-16, led by newcomer **Thomas Greiss**, who set a career high with 23 victories (after never posting more than 10 in one campaign). Greiss also ranked third in the NHL and set a single-season franchise record with a .925 save percentage.

WASHINGTON CAPITALS vs. PITTSBURGH PENGUINS

SERIES QUICK HITS

* This marks the ninth playoff meeting between the Capitals and Penguins and first since the 2009 Eastern Conference Semifinals, when Pittsburgh defeated Washington in a thrilling seven-game series en route to its third (and most recent) Stanley Cup.

* Washington's **Alex Ovechkin** totaled 8-6—14 in that seven-game series, while Pittsburgh's **Sidney Crosby** countered with 8-5—13. Both players recorded hat tricks in Game 2 and scored in Game 7, but Crosby posted 2-1—3 in the finale to lead the Penguins to victory.

* Ovechkin (525-441—966) and Crosby (338-600—938) rank first and second, respectively, in NHL scoring since entering the League in 2005-06. Crosby (707 GP), however, has played in 132 fewer games than Ovechkin (839 GP). Overall, Crosby and the Penguins are 24-12-2 in their 38 regular-season meetings with Ovechkin and the Capitals. Crosby has 19-36—55 in those contests, while Ovechkin has 22-16—38.

* This series features several familiar faces on opposite ends of the rink: Washington's **Matt Niskanen** (2011-14) and **Brooks Orpik** (2002-14) both played for the Penguins, while Pittsburgh's **Eric Fehr** (2005-11 and 2012-15) spent nine of his first 10 NHL seasons with the Capitals.

DID YOU KNOW?

* The Capitals allowed six goals in their six-game victory over the Flyers in the First Round. That was their fewest goals against in a best-of-seven series in franchise history, besting the seven they allowed in the 1998 CSF vs. OTT (5 GP).

* Goaltender **Braden Holtby**, who equaled an NHL record with 48 wins during the regular season, posted a 0.84 goals-against average, .968 save percentage and two shutouts during the team's First Round win. His 1.76 career goals-against average and .940 career save percentage both rank first in Stanley Cup Playoffs history among goaltenders who have played in at least 20 games.

* Captain **Alex Ovechkin**, who already held the club record for playoff goals (39), leapfrogged **Dale Hunter** (72) for the most postseason points in Capitals history – finishing the First Round with 75. During the regular season, Ovechkin became the third player in NHL history to total seven or more 50-goal seasons (also, **Mike Bossy** and **Wayne Gretzky**).

* The Presidents' Trophy-winning Capitals set a franchise record with 56 victories during the regular season, eclipsing the mark of 54 set in 2009-10. Their 120 points were one shy of the team record, also established in 2009-10 (when they won their only other Presidents' Trophy).

* A League-leading 29 victories at home guided the Capitals to their prolific season. Their 29 such wins were one shy of the franchise record (30), established in 1985-86 and equaled in 2009-10. Washington nearly matched that effort on the road, where it set a club record with 27 victories (three more than in 2009-10).

The other: **Les Binkley**, who won his first four playoff starts in 1970.

* The Penguins went 14-2-0 in their final 16 games of the season to climb into second place in the Metropolitan Division. They did so without the services of forward **Evgeni Malkin**, who missed the last 15 contests of the season (as well as the team's first playoff game) due to injury.

* Captain **Sidney Crosby** ranked third in the NHL with 36-49—85 in 80 games this season. That included a League-best 27-31—58 and +22 rating during the calendar year (44 GP). He also had two point streaks of 11-plus games in that span: Jan. 12 – Feb. 8 (12-10—22 in 11 GP) and Feb. 29 – March 20 (6-14—20).

* **Kris Letang** ranked third among NHL defensemen with 16-51—67 this season to establish career highs in all three scoring categories. He and Crosby also shared the League lead with a +22 rating after the calendar turned to 2016.

* The rivalry between the Stars and Blues goes back nearly half a century, to the early days of the NHL's post-expansion era. Both franchises joined the League in 1967-68 and were placed in the West Division. They met in the Stanley Cup Playoffs in their inaugural season, staging an epic, seven-game Semifinals series that was won the Blues in double-overtime on a goal by **Ron Schock**.

* Blues head coach **Ken Hitchcock**, who ranks fourth on the all-time list for regular-season coaching wins (757), will face a fellow top five bench boss for the second consecutive series. Hitchcock topped **Joel Quenneville** of the Blackhawks (2nd: 801) in the First Round and will match tactics with **Lindy Ruff** of the Stars (5th: 702) in the Second Round.

* Hitchcock captured the first and only Stanley Cup in Stars history as head coach of the team in 1998-99, when Dallas defeated Ruff and Buffalo in six games in the Final. Hitchcock posted a 277-154-72 record in seven seasons with the Stars as well as a 47-33 clip in five playoff appearances.

DID YOU KNOW?

* The Stars won their first division title since 2005-06 (Pacific Division) and first conference crown since 2002-03. They also reached the 50-win milestone for the fourth time in franchise history and first time since 2006-07.

* Stars captain **Jamie Benn** scored a career-high 41 goals, becoming the first Stars player to eclipse the 40-goal mark since **Mike Modano** registered 50 goals during the 1993-94 season. The 2014-15 Art Ross Trophy winner finished the regular season second in the League scoring race with a career-high 89 points (41-48—89). Benn also shared second in the NHL with 17 power-play goals – another career high – and ranked third in goals.

* Forward **Jason Spezza** recorded his 30th goal of the season on March 29, becoming the third Stars player to reach the 30-goal plateau in 2015-16, joining **Jamie Benn** (41) and **Tyler Seguin** (33). The Stars (along with the Bruins) became the first team to feature at least three 30-goal scorers in the same season since 2011-12, when the Devils and Sharks each had three. This marks the first time since the Stars moved to Dallas in 1993-94 that the team had at least three players reach the 30-goal mark.

* Stars forward **Tyler Seguin**, who played in Game 2 of the First Round vs. MIN, suffered an Achilles laceration on March 17 and was expected to miss 3-4 weeks from the time of the injury. When he was sidelined, Seguin shared fifth place in the NHL scoring race with 73 points (33-40—73) and ranked eighth among goal-scorers.

Marleau scored 10 goals in 10 games (10-4—14), while Thornton notched 10 assists (0-10—10). The lone player on the current Predators roster who faced the Sharks in those back-to-back series is defenseman **Shea Weber** (2-3—5 in 9 GP).

* Sharks forward **Joel Ward** will face his former club in the postseason for the first time. Ward signed as a free agent with the Predators in July 2008 and played his first full NHL season with the club in 2008-09. He went on to make 230 regular-season appearances over three seasons with Nashville, capped by a strong playoff run in 2011 during which he led the team in goals and points (7-6—13 in 12 GP).

DID YOU KNOW?

* The Sharks are in the Stanley Cup Playoffs for the 11th time in the past 12 seasons and the 18th time in their 24 NHL seasons. San Jose's 11 playoff appearances since 2003-04 rank second to Detroit (12-for-12) for the most in that span.

* San Jose entered play on Jan. 9 with a record of 18-18-2, ranking sixth in the Pacific Division, 13th in the Western Conference and 27th in the NHL. The Sharks went 28-12-4 thereafter, leaping to third in the Pacific, sixth in the West and 11th in the NHL by season's end.

* The Sharks set a franchise record for road wins (28-10-3). Their 28 road wins led the League and tied for the second-most in NHL history, trailing only the Red Wings' 31 such victories in 2005-06. The Sharks continued that success in the First Round of the Stanley Cup Playoffs, defeating the Kings in all three games at STAPLES Center.

* The Sharks had three players place among the top 11 scorers in the NHL: **Joe Thornton** (t-4th, 19-63—82); **Joe Pavelski** (t-6th, 38-40—78) and **Brent Burns** (11th, 27-48—75). The only other club to boast a trio of 70-point scorers was the Capitals (**Evgeny Kuznetsov**, 20-57—77; **Alex Ovechkin**, 50-21—71; **Nicklas Backstrom**, 20-50—70). Thornton ranked second in the League in assists (63), tallied his highest point total since 2009-10 (89) and his highest goal total since 2010-11 (21). He recorded at least one point in each of San Jose's final 33 wins of the regular season.

* Forward **Logan Couture** returned to the lineup on Dec. 30 after missing 30 of San Jose's first 35 games due to injury. With Couture in the lineup the Sharks were 32-15-5 in the regular season, vs. 14-15-1 without him.

* **Brent Burns** rewrote the Sharks' record book during the 2015-16 record season, setting single-season marks for goals (27), assists (48) and points (75) by a defenseman as well as shots on goal (353).

STANLEY CUP PLAYOFF FORMATS

2013-14 — The NHL's clubs were realigned into two conferences, each consisting of two divisions. The number of teams qualifying for the Stanley Cup Playoffs remains unchanged at 16. Twelve first-round playoff berths will be awarded to the top three finishers in each of the four divisions. These clubs will be the first three "seeds" in each division. Two additional "Wild Card" berths will be awarded to the next two highest-placed finishers in each conference, ranked on the basis of regular-season points and regardless of division. The first-place finisher with the highest number of regular-season points in the conference will be matched against the Wild Card team with the lowest number of regular-season points, and the first-place finisher with the second-highest number of regular-season points in the conference matched against the Wild Card team with the second-lowest number of regular-season points.

In each division, the team seeded #1 plays #4; #2 plays #3.

The two advancing teams in the West and two advancing teams in the East meet in the Conference Finals.

The Eastern and Western Conference champions will meet in the Stanley Cup Final.

Home-ice advantage in the Stanley Cup Final will be determined by points.

All series remain best-of-seven.

1998-99 – The NHL's clubs were realigned into two conferences, each consisting of three divisions. The number of teams qualifying for the Stanley Cup Playoffs remained at 16. First-round playoff berths were awarded to the first-place team in each division as well as to the next five best teams based on regular-season point totals in each conference. The three division winners in each conference were seeded first through third, in order of points, for the playoffs and the next five best teams, in order of points, were seeded fourth through eighth. In each conference, the team seeded #1 played #8; #2 vs. #7; #3 vs. #6; and #4 vs. #5 in the Quarterfinal Round. Home-ice in the Conference Quarterfinals was granted to those teams seeded first through fourth in each conference. In the Conference Semifinals and Conference Finals, teams were re-seeded according to the same criteria as the Conference Quarterfinals. Higher-seeded teams gained home-ice advantage. Home-ice advantage for the Stanley Cup Final to be determined by regular-season points. All series remain best-of-seven.

1994-95 – Same as 1993-94, except that in first-, second- or third-round playoff series involving Central and Pacific Division teams, the team with the better record had the choice of using either a 2-3-2 or a 2-2-1-1-1 format. When a 2-3-2 format was selected, the higher-ranked team also had the choice of playing games 1, 2, 6 and 7 at home or playing games 3, 4 and 5 at home. The format for the Stanley Cup Final remained 2-2-1-1-1.

1993-94 – The NHL's playoff draw was conference-based rather than division-based. At the conclusion of the regular season, the top eight teams in each of the Eastern and Western Conferences qualified for the playoffs. The teams that finished in first place in each of the League's divisions are seeded first and second in each conference's playoff draw and were assured of home-ice advantage in the first two playoff rounds. The remaining teams were seeded based on their regular-season point totals. In each conference, the team seeded #1 plays #8; #2 vs. #7; #3 vs. #6; and #4 vs. #5. All series were best-of-seven with home ice rotating on a 2-2-1-1-1 basis, with the exception of matchups between Central and Pacific Division teams. These matchups were played on a 2-3-2 basis to reduce travel. In a 2-3-2 series, the team with the most points could choose to start the series at home or on the road. The Eastern Conference champion faced the Western Conference champion in the Stanley Cup Final.

1986-87 – Division Semifinal series changed from best-of-five to best-of-seven.

1981-82 – The first four teams in each division earned playoff berths. In each division, the first-place team opposed the fourth-place team and the second-place team opposed the third-place team in a best-of-five Division Semifinal (DSF) series. In each division, the two winners of the DSF met in a best-of-seven Division Final (DF) series. The two DF winners in each conference met in a best-of-seven Conference Final (CF) series. In the Prince of Wales Conference, the Adams Division winner opposed the Patrick Division winner; in the Clarence Campbell Conference, the Smythe Division winner opposed the Norris Division winner. The two CF winners met in a best-of-seven Stanley Cup Final.

1979-80 – The League expanded its playoff structure to include 16 teams. The four first-place teams in the four divisions automatically earned playoff berths. Another 12, according to regular-season record, also earned berths. All 16 teams were then pooled together and ranked #1 to #16 based on regular-season record:

Series F: Team #6 vs. Team #11 (best-of-five)
Series G: Team #7 vs. Team #10 (best-of-five)
Series H: Team #8 vs. Team #9 (best-of-five)

The eight Preliminary Round winners, ranked #1 to #8 based on regular-season record, moved on to the Quarterfinals:

Series I: Team #1 vs. Team #8 (best-of-seven)
Series J: Team #2 vs. Team #7 (best-of-seven)
Series K: Team #3 vs. Team #6 (best-of-seven)
Series L: Team #4 vs. Team #5 (best-of-seven)

The four Quarterfinals winners, ranked #1 to #4 based on regular-season record, moved on to the Semifinals:

Series M: Team #1 vs. Team #4 (best-of-seven)
Series N: Team #2 vs. Team #3 (best-of-seven)
Series O: Winner of Series M vs. winner of Series N (best-of-seven)

1977-78 – Same as 1974-75, except that the Preliminary Round consisted of the #2 teams in the four divisions and the next four teams based on regular-season record (not their standings within their divisions).

1974-75 – With the League now expanded to 18 teams in four divisions, a completely new playoff format was introduced. First, the #2 and #3 teams in each of the four divisions were pooled together in the Preliminary Round. These eight (#2 and #3) clubs were ranked #1 to #8 based on regular-season record:

Series A: Team #1 vs. Team #8 (best-of-three)
Series B: Team #2 vs. Team #7 (best-of-three)
Series C: Team #3 vs. Team #6 (best-of-three)
Series D: Team #4 vs. Team #5 (best-of-three)

The winners of this Preliminary Round then pooled together with the four division winners, which had received byes into this Quarterfinal Round. These eight teams were again ranked #1 to #8 based on regular-season record:

Series E: Team #1 vs. Team #8 (best-of-seven)
Series F: Team #2 vs. Team #7 (best-of-seven)
Series G: Team #3 vs. Team #6 (best-of-seven)
Series H: Team #4 vs. Team #5 (best-of-seven)

The four Quarterfinal winners, which moved on to the Semifinals, were then ranked #1 to #4 based on regular-season record:

Series I: Team #1 vs. Team #4 (best-of-seven)
Series J: Team #2 vs. Team #3 (best-of-seven)
Series K: Winner of Series I vs. Winner of Series J (best-of-seven)

1971-72 – Same as 1970-71, except that Series A and C matched the first- and fourth-place teams, and Series B and D matched the second- and third-place teams.

1970-71 – Same as 1967-68 except that Series E matched the winners of Series A and D, and Series F matched the winners of Series B and C.

1967-68 – When it doubled in size from six to 12 teams, the NHL once again was divided into two divisions – East and West – of six teams apiece. The top four clubs in each division qualified for the playoffs (all series were best-of-seven):

Series A: First (East) vs. Third (East)
Series B: Second (East) vs. Fourth (East)
Series C: First (West) vs. Third (West)
Series D: Second (West) vs. Fourth (West)
Series E: Winner of Series A vs. Winner of Series B
Series F: Winner of Series C vs. Winner of Series D
Series G: Winner of Series E vs. Winner of Series F

1942-43 – With the NHL reduced to six teams (the “Original Six”), only the top four finishers qualified for playoff action. The best-of-seven Semifinals pitted Team #1 vs. Team #3 and Team #2 vs. Team #4. The winners of each Semifinal series met in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup Final.

1938-39 – With the NHL reduced to seven teams, the two-division system was replaced by one seven-team League. Based on final regular-season standings, the following playoff format was adopted:

Series A: First vs. Second (best-of-seven)
Series B: Third vs. Fourth (best-of-three)
Series C: Fifth vs. Sixth (best-of-three)
Series D: Winner of Series B vs. Winner of Series C (best-of-three)
Series E: Winner of Series A vs. Winner of Series D (best-of-seven)

1936-37 – Same as 1931-32, except that Series B, C and D were each best-of-three.

1931-32 – Same as 1928-29, except that Series D was changed to a two-game, total-goals format and Series E was changed to best-of-five.

1928-29 – Both first-place teams in the two divisions played each other in a best-of-five series. Both second-place teams in the two divisions played each other in a two-game, total-goals series as did the two third-place teams. The winners of these latter two series then played each other in a best-of-three series for the right to meet the winner of the series between the two first-place clubs. This Stanley Cup Final was a best-of-three.

Series A: First in Canadian Division vs. First in American Division (best-of-five)
Series B: Second in Canadian Division vs. Second in American Division (two-game, total-goals)
Series C: Third in Canadian Division vs. Third in American Division (two-game, total-goals)
Series D: Winner of Series B vs. Winner of Series C (best-of-three)
Series E: Winner of Series A vs. Winner of Series D (best-of-three) for Stanley Cup

1926-27 – The 10-team league was divided into two divisions – Canadian and American – of five teams apiece. In each division, the winner of the two-game, total-goals series between the second- and third-place teams faced the first-place team in a two-game, total-goals series for the division title. The two division title winners then met in the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final.

1925-26 – The format that was intended for 1924-25 went into effect. The winner of the two-game, total-goals series between the second- and third-place teams squared off against the first-place team in the two-game, total-goals NHL championship series. The NHL champion then moved on to play the Western Hockey League champion in the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final. After the 1925-26 season, the NHL was the only major professional hockey league still in existence and consequently took over sole control of the Stanley Cup competition.

1924-25 – The first place team (Hamilton) at the conclusion of the regular season was scheduled to play the winner of a two-game, total-goals series between the second- (Toronto) and third- (Montreal) place clubs. However, Hamilton refused to abide by this new format, demanding greater compensation than offered by the League. Thus, Toronto and Montreal played their two-game, total-goals series, and the winner (Montreal) earned the NHL title and then played the WCHL champion (Victoria) in the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final.

1923-24 – The top two teams at the conclusion of the regular season faced each other in a two-game, total-goals series for the NHL championship. The NHL champion then moved on to play the loser of the PCHA-WCHL playoff (the winner of the PCHA-WCHL playoff earned a bye into the Stanley Cup Final) in the best-of-three Stanley Cup Semifinals. The winner of this series met the PCHA-WCHL playoff winner in the best-of-three Stanley Cup Final.

1922-23 – The top two teams at the conclusion of the regular season faced each other in a two-game, total-goals series for the NHL championship. The NHL champion then moved on to play the PCHA champion in the best-of-three Stanley Cup Semifinals, and the winner of the Semifinals played the WCHL champion, which had been given a bye, in the best-of-three Stanley Cup Final.

1921-22 – The top two teams at the conclusion of the regular season faced each other in a two-game, total-goals series for the NHL championship. The NHL champion then moved on to play the winner of the PCHA-Western Canada Hockey League playoff series in the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final.

1919-20 – Same as 1917-18, except that Ottawa won both halves of the split regular-season schedule to earn an automatic berth into the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final against the PCHA champions.

1918-19 – Same as 1917-18, except that the NHL Final was extended to a best-of-seven series.

1917-18 – The regular season was split into two halves. The winners of both halves faced each other in a two-game, total-goals series for the NHL championship and the right to meet the Pacific Coast Hockey Association champion in the best-of-five Stanley Cup Final.

STANLEY CUP FACTS

- Oldest trophy competed for by professional athletes in North America
- Was crafted in Sheffield, England, in the late 1800s
- Was first presented in 1893
- Logged more than 1 million miles in travel over the last 10 seasons, including trips to Afghanistan, Austria, the Bahamas, Belarus, Belgium, Canada, the Czech Republic, England, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Liechtenstein, Mexico, Russia, Scotland, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, Ukraine, the United Arab Emirates and the United States
- Is made of silver and nickel alloy, and weighs 35 pounds and stands at three feet tall
- Was purchased for 10 guineas (\$48.67 at the time) in 1892 on behalf of Lord Stanley of Preston, the Governor General of Canada, for whom the Stanley Cup was named
- The Stanley Cup was originally called the “Dominion Challenge Cup”
- The Montreal AAAs (Amateur Athletic Association) were the first winners of the Stanley Cup
- When it was originally bought, the Stanley Cup was a silver bowl measuring seven inches high and 11.5 inches in diameter
- 1926 was the first year that the Stanley Cup was competed for solely by NHL teams
- In 1927, to accommodate names of players being etched into the Cup, silver bands were added to the bottom of the bowl
- In 1970, the original bowl crafted in 1892 was retired because it became too brittle to travel; it is currently secured in a locked vault at the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto
- Is the only trophy in professional sports that is passed along from player to player the summer their team wins it
- Is so revered by NHL players that many who have not won it refuse to be in its presence
- Is the only trophy in professional sports that has 24-hour supervision and is accompanied by a full-time bodyguard, known as the Keeper of the Cup
- The Keeper of the Cup only handles the Cup while wearing white gloves
- Was the first professional team sports trophy to be presented to the winning team on the playing surface, immediately following the team’s victory; many other sports do this today
- Travels close to 300 days per year
- Is the only trophy in professional sports that has the names of winning players, coaches, management and club staff engraved on the silver chalice
- The tradition of engraving names on the Cup began in 1907 with the Montreal Wanderers
- It takes 13 years to fill the ring of the Stanley Cup with names of winners
- Two rings (spanning 26 years) have been retired at the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto
- Names misspelled on the Stanley Cup – Adam Deadmarsh of the Colorado Avalanche in 1996 was spelled “Deadmarch,” but was changed; the first misspelled name to be corrected
- Detroit Red Wings Manny Legace’s name also was misspelled and later corrected in 2002; Tomas Holmström was misspelled and corrected following the 2008 Red Wings engraving; Kris Versteeg was spelled as ‘Vertseeg’ in 2010 with Chicago but has been corrected
- Some other misspellings on the Cup that never have been corrected: Jacques Plante’s name has been misspelled, (including “Jac,” and “Jacq”); Bob Gainey was spelled “Gainy” when he was a player for Montreal in the 1970s; Ted Kennedy was spelled “Kennedyy” in the 1940s; New York Islanders was spelled “Ilanders” in 1980-81; the Toronto Maple Leafs was spelled “Leaes” in 1962-63; the Boston Bruins was spelled “Bqstqn” in 1972
- Name scratched out – “Basil Pocklington,” father of former Edmonton Oilers owner, Peter, put his dad’s name on the Stanley Cup in 1983-84; today, on the Cup, one can see a series of “Xs” over his name
- There is only one Stanley Cup – authenticated by the seal of the Hockey Hall of Fame in the bottom of the Cup; this seal can be seen when winning players lift the Cup over their heads
