# **RECORDS.NHL.COM**

On Sept. 17, the National Hockey League took another step in providing fans unprecedented access to its rich hockey history by introducing a new information website, <u>records.nhl.com</u>. The new site builds on last season's momentum with the online addition of one hundred years of statistical game data.

With this launch, all of the NHL's official records are updated daily and available digitally for the first time ever to provide users with access to all the latest information. Designed to utilize the League's entire historical statistical database, <u>records.nhl.com</u> provides hockey fans, media and broadcasters a user-friendly, one-stop platform to stay connected to the game.

- Sortable and easy-to-use records for skaters, goaltenders and teams, with expanded lists for the regular season and playoffs;
- Up to thousands of results for each record with links to box scores and player pages;
- Sortable lists of historical skater milestones, including <u>500 goals</u> and <u>1,000 points;</u>
- All-time playoff and regular-season standings, aggregated by franchise and updated daily;
- Extensive <u>franchise history</u>, including sortable year-by-year records and all-time record vs. opponents, franchise records, lists of all-time captains, coaches, GMs, retired numbers, and more;
- In-depth history of all major NHL team and individual awards and trophies, including historic photography of <u>Stanley</u> <u>Cup</u> winners, and historic team logos;
- A history of the progression of major scoring records, including most goals/season, most goals/career, most assists/season, most assists/career, most points/season and most points/career;
- Complete sortable, pick-by-pick history of the <u>NHL Draft</u> dating to 1963;
- Event-specific history including preseason games (<u>Hockeyville</u>, <u>China Games</u>, etc.), games held <u>outside North</u> <u>America</u>, <u>All-Star Games</u> and <u>outdoor games</u>;
- History Section: League-related history, <u>game attendance</u>, historical <u>rule changes</u>, playoff formats, Hockey Hall of Fame selections and current members of the NHL's Board of Governors.

The launch of the new site represents the first of a multi-phase rollout. Future enhancements will include additional integration of historic video and photos, coaching records and register, new records and record categories and additional means to search and sort information.

If Marleau plays all 82 games, he would surpass Larry Murphy (1,615; 9th), Scott Stevens (1,635; 8th), Dave Andreychuk (1,639; 7th), Chris Chelios (1,651; 6th) and Mark Recchi (1,652; 5th).

\* San Jose Sharks C **Joe Thornton** (1,493) needs two games to tie Phil Housley (1,495) for 20th place on the NHL's alltime games played list. If Thornton plays all 82 games, he would surpass Mike Modano (1,499; 19th), Steve Yzerman (1,514; 18th), Brendan Shanahan (1,524; 17th), Johnny Bucyk (1,540; t-15th), Shane Doan (1,540; t-15th), Alex Delvecchio (1,550; 14th), Jarome Iginla (1,554; 13th) and Nicklas Lidstrom (1,564; 12th).

\* Pittsburgh Penguins C **Matt Cullen** (1,445) needs one game to surpass Tim Horton (1,445) for sole possession of 27th place on the NHL's all-time games played list. Players between Cullen and San Jose Sharks C Joe Thornton: Teemu Selanne (1,451; 26th), Glen Wesley (1,457; 25th), Doug Gilmour (1,474; 24th), Rod Brind'Amour (1,484; 23rd) and Wayne Gretzky (1,487; 22nd).

#### Goals

\* Washington Capitals LW **Alex Ovechkin** (607) needs one goal to tie Dino Ciccarelli (608) for 18th place on the NHL's all-time goals list. A 50-goal season also would propel Ovechkin into 13th place in NHL history, moving him past Bobby Hull (610; 17th), Jarome Iginla (625; 16th), Joe Sakic (625; 15th), Dave Andreychuk (640; 14th) and Brendan Shanahan (656; 13th).

\* Washington Capitals LW **Alex Ovechkin** (229; 10th) also can move up the NHL's all-time power-play goals list. If he scores 15 power-play goals, he will pass Dino Ciccarelli (232; 9th), Marcel Dionne (234; 8th), Mario Lemieux (236; 7th) and Brendan Shanahan (237; 6th) and be within reach of Phil Esposito (246; 5th) and Luc Robitaille (247; 4th).

\* Toronto Maple Leafs C **Patrick Marleau** (103; 7th) and Washington Capitals LW **Alex Ovechkin** (102; 8th) can climb the NHL's all-time game-winning goals list. Marleau and Ovechkin each are within eight game-winning goals of Brendan Shanahan (109; 6th), Teemu Selanne (110; t-4th) and Brett Hull (110; t-4th).

\* Los Angeles Kings LW **Ilya Kovalchuk** (14) ranks eighth on the NHL's all-time overtime goals list, one back of Mats Sundin (15), Marian Hossa (15) and Sergei Fedorov (15), who are tied for fifth place, and two behind Daniel Sedin (16) and Patrik Elias (16), who share third place.

#### Assists

\* San Jose Sharks C **Joe Thornton** (1,030) needs three assists to tie Mario Lemieux (1,033) for 11th place on the NHL's all-time assists list. A 40-assist season also would propel Thornton into eighth place in NHL history, moving him past Marcel Dionne (1,040th; 10th), Gordie Howe (1,049; 9th) and Steve Yzerman (1,063; 8th), and within nine of tying Adam Oates (1,079; 7th).

\* San Jose Sharks C **Joe Thornton** (1,427) needs 30 points to tie Teemu Selanne (1,457) for 15th place on the NHL's alltime points list and 40 to tie Stan Mikita (1,467; 14th).

\* New York Rangers G **Henrik Lundqvist** (805) needs 15 games to tie Sean Burke (820) for 13th place on the NHL's alltime games played list among goaltenders. A 60-game season also would move Lundqvist past Jacques Plante (837; 12th) and Gump Worsley (860; 11th) and within three of tying Grant Fuhr (868; 10th).

\* Florida Panthers G **Roberto Luongo** (471) needs 13 wins to tie Ed Belfour (484) for third place on the NHL's all-time wins list, behind Patrick Roy (551; 2nd) and Martin Brodeur (691; 1st).

\* New York Rangers G **Henrik Lundqvist** (431) needs six wins to tie Jacques Plante (437) for seventh place on the NHL's all-time wins list. Lundqvist also sits 14 wins shy of tying Terry Sawchuk (445; 6th) and 23 shy of equaling Curtis Joseph (454; 5th).

\* Vegas Golden Knights G **Marc-Andre Fleury** (404) needs three wins to tie Glenn Hall (407) for 10th place on the NHL's all-time wins list and 19 to match Tony Esposito (423; 9th).

\* Anaheim Ducks G **Ryan Miller** (370) needs two wins to tie Andy Moog (372) for 17th place on the NHL's all-time wins list and four to match John Vanbiesbrouck (374; 16th). A 20-win season also would leapfrog Miller ahead of Mike Vernon (385; 15th) and Dominik Hasek (389; 14th).

# APPROVED RULE CHANGES

The NHL has instituted the following rule changes effective for the 2018-19 season. The <u>official rule book</u> is available for download at records.nhl.com under the "History" tab.

#### Rule 10.2 Goalkeeper's stick: (Added to existing rule)

Requests for an exemption to the length of the paddle (only) may be submitted in writing to and must be approved by the League's Hockey Operations Department prior to any stick being approved for use. Only players 6'6" tall or more will be considered for exemption. Maximum length of a stick paddle granted exemption under this rule is twenty-six inches (26").

#### Rule 11.3 Chest and Arm Pads:

The chest and arm protector worn by each goalkeeper must be anatomically proportional and size specific based on the individual physical characteristics of that goalkeeper.

No raised ridges are allowed on the front edges or sides of the chest pad, the inside or outside of the arms, or across the shoulders. Layering at the lateral edge of the torso is permitted to add rib protection, however, said thickness shall not exceed the thickness of the blocks on the front of the chest and, provided further, that the flank protection must wrap around the contour of the player's torso.

Layering at the elbow ("elbow floater" is permitted to add protection but not to add stopping area, such that:

On each side, the elbow floaters shall:

- Not exceed six inches (6") in width across the front of the elbow;
- Not exceed seven inches (7") in depth;
- Have a total length that does not exceed six and one-half inches (6 ½") when measured from the proximal end of the biceps segment to the distal end of the forearm segment;
- Be symmetrically positioned relative to the underlying elbow;

On each side, the arm protection shall taper such that:

- The upper portion of the bicep pad shall not exceed five and one-half inches (5 1/2");
- The lower portion of the bicep pad shall not exceed four and one-half inches (4 1/2")
- The upper portion of the forearm pad shall not exceed four and one-half inches (4 1/2"); and
- The lower portion of the forearm pad shall not exceed four inches (4").

On each side, the clavicle floaters shall:

- Have a maximum thickness that does not exceed one inch (1");
- Not exceed five and one-half inches (5 1/2") in width when measured at the widest point of the clavicle/floater pad;
- Not project/extend beyond the lateral edge of the player's shoulder;
- Not project/extend beyond the armpit at the level of the axilla;
- Not project/extend beyond the lateral edge of the player's torso below the level of the chest;
- Not project/extend vertically above the player's shoulder more than two inches (2") when measured at its lateral edge;
- Not project/extend vertically above the player's shoulder more than one and one-half inches (1 1/2") when measured at the midpoint of its width; and
- Not project/extend vertically above the player's shoulder more than one-half inch (1/2") when measured at its medial edge.

On each side the shoulder caps shall:

- Follow the contour of the player's shoulder without becoming a projection/extension above the shoulder; and
- Not project/extend laterally beyond the player's shoulder more than one and one-half inches (1 1/2").

The chest and arm pad may not be worn in a manner such that the unit is forced upward or remains above the goalkeeper's shoulder beyond the limits previously defined in this rule when the goalkeeper drops to a butterfly or kneeling position.

#### Rule Changes

No additional pads, straps, laces or attachments may be added to the chest and arm pad after it has been inspected and approved by the League's Hockey Operations Department. Any alteration requests to the chest and arm pad must be filed with an application to the Hockey Operations Department before any modifications or additions are made.

The League's Hockey Operations Department will determine the maximum size for each goalkeeper's chest and arm protector based on measurements obtained by the League's Hockey Operations Department which will include, but not be limited to, measurements for shoulder width, torso width/length and arm length. Any chest and arm protector deemed by the Hockey Operations Department to be too large for a goalkeeper will be considered illegal equipment for that goalkeeper, regardless of whether or not it would have fallen within previous equipment maximums.

#### Rule 11.4 Pants:

The pants worn by each goalkeeper must be anatomically proportional and size-specific based on the individual physical characteristics of that goalkeeper.

Each goalkeeper will be assigned a pant size appropriate for their waist size and based on the following waist circumference measurement ranges, measured in inches:

32-34.49 34.5-36.49 36.5-38.49 38.5-40.49 40.5+

All measurements made by NHL Hockey Operations will be at the maximum circumference and/or width of the waist and thigh/leg opening.

All measurements shall be made with a cloth tape.

The waist on the pant may not exceed six inches (6") in height as circumference of the thigh/leg opening may not exceed thirty-two inches (32") in length.

No internal or external padding is permitted on the pant leg or waist beyond that which is required to provide protection (i.e., no outside or inside ridges).


No lacing, rib knit, belts or eyelet may be worn in a manner that allows for an increase in the waist circumference beyond a reasonable amount above the goalkeeper's assigned size.

The thigh guard measurement shall be taken while the goalkeeper is in an upright standing position and this measurement shall be made five inches (5") up from the bottom of the pant. If the pant includes groin and/or hip pads, they must not extend beyond the edge of the front thigh pad. Groin/hip pads will be included as part of the 9-inch thigh guard measurement referenced below.

Each thigh guard shall comply with the following:

- A constant outer and inner curvature must be maintained and the outer width may not exceed nine inches (9"). The curvature depth must be at least four and one-half inches (4 ½") and not greater than five and one-half inches (5 ½")
- The inner arc length shall be determined by the actual thigh guard depth and width using the attached formula, and shall be between fourteen and sixteen inches (14"-16")
- The length of the thigh guard shall be at least eight inches (8") and not greater than eleven inches (11")
- The thickness of the thigh guard may not exceed one and three-eighths inches (1 3/8") at its widest point
- Padding on the inside or outside thigh cradle may not exceed one inch (1"); it must be attached to the inside of the curved thigh guard; and it cannot create a seam, ridge, or extend beyond or increase the width of the curvature of the thigh guard.

#### **Rule Changes**



The League's Hockey Operations Department will determine the maximum size for each goalkeeper's pant based on measurements obtained by the League's Hockey Operations Department, which will include, but not be limited to, measurements for waist circumference, thigh circumference, hip circumference, and length of the thigh. Any pant deemed by the Hockey Operations Department to be not compliant with this Rule will be considered illegal equipment for that goalkeeper, regardless of whether or not it would have fallen within previous equipment maximums.

Any alteration request must be filed with an application to the Hockey Operations Department before any modifications or additions are made.

#### Rule 25.1 Awarded Goal:

**Awarded Goal –** A goal will be awarded to the attacking team when the opposing team has taken their goalkeeper off the ice and an attacking player has possession and control of the puck (or would have gained possession and control) in the neutral or attacking zone, without a defending player between himself and the opposing goal, and he is prevented from scoring as a result of an infraction committed by the defending team (see **25.3** Infractions – When Goalkeeper is Off the Ice, below).

#### Rule 36.1 – Goal Judge:

**General Duties** – The Goal Judge shall signal, normally by means of red light, a decision as to whether the puck passed between the goal posts and entirely over the goal line. The only decision is whether the puck actually entered the net, not how or when it went in. The light must be illuminated for a period of five (5) seconds each time the puck enters the net regardless of circumstances. It is up to the Referees and/or Video Goal Judge to decide if it is a goal.
